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

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Preparations for Fall 2024 Semester

First, construction and renovation work has officially begun on McCarthy Hall. Slated for a July 2025 completion, this historic building will be repurposed to serve as the home for VCSU's School of Education and Technology Education. As you navigate campus, you will notice some important changes in the southeast corner. Work has started on the construction of a new foyer and entrance which will connect McFarland and McCarthy in a climate controlled, updated and welcoming foyer.

Secondly, interior changes and updates are nearing completion in "The Bubble." With added VCSU branding, refreshed painting, refinished playing surface, reconfigured seating, and the addition of a VCSU store in one of the former concession areas, the updated facility will continue to welcome thousands of patrons, students, and members of the public for years to come.

We thank all our facilities and grounds workers for continuing the preparations for our Fall semester.



Creating a named scholarship through the VCSU Foundation helps the University stretch our resources. By doing so, you not only honor a special person in your life but also create a lasting legacy that will support our students for years to come.

How to Create a Named Scholarship

You will need to determine the type of scholarship fund you would like to establish. Available choices include endowed or an annual scholarships.

Endowed Scholarships

Endowed scholarship funds are designed to be permanent and perpetual. The principal of the fund is invested to produce income, and an annual award is made to students. The principal remains untouched, so the endowment can last for decades. Because this type of scholarship relies on investment income, it takes at least \$10,500 to create an endowed scholarship that provides a scholarship at its creation. You can provide the full gift amount at the outset or make a smaller initial commitment that you add to over time until the endowment reaches \$10,500. You may add to it at any point.

Annual Scholarships

Annual Named scholarships can be established with an outright gift of \$1,000 or more and a commitment of 4 years. This allows for an annual gift to be awarded yearly over the four-year period.

Unlike an endowed scholarship, an annual scholarship is not a permanent fund. Awards are given to students only as long as you (or others) choose to contribute to the fund.

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Work begins to transform McCarthy Hall into the future VCSU School of Education

VCSU leaders, faculty, staff and community members mark the occasion with official groundbreaking event.

Valley City State University (VCSU) hosted a groundbreaking ceremony outside of McCarthy Hall to officially mark the start of transformational work on the historic building.

McCarthy Hall will become the new home for VCSU's nationally-recognized School of Education and Technology and STEM Education. VCSU faculty, community members and leaders in education attended the event. Work began today on the building and the space is anticipated to be ready for students by the fall of 2025.

"I'm happy that we're able to preserve this historic facility and renovate it to its grandeur. This will modernize McCarthy Hall to serve as the destination school of education for our state and region for the next 50 years. This will have an incredible positive impact for our community, the teacher workforce in North Dakota, and for the incredible cutting-edge educational experiences that our faculty will provide to students," President Alan LaFave said during the event.

Valley City Mayor Dave Carlsrud said "VCSU and the Valley City Public School System are important components of the community, and VCSU is the 'face of education in North Dakota.' We have something over 1,500 alumni represented serving schools throughout North Dakota, and (VCSU) graduates more people in education than any other school in the state," Carlsrud said. "That's significant and you can be proud of that."

"K-12 education and higher education are facing an unprecedented shortage of teachers across the state of North Dakota," Valley City Public School System Superintendent Josh Johnson said. "Valley City State has been at the forefront of helping to address this issue. I think this project speaks again to that effort and will further help address the crisis that we are facing. Thank you President LaFave, Dr. Burgad and all the faculty and staff of VCSU for your leadership in education in North Dakota."

"The modernized renovations of McCarthy Hall will extend 21st-century learning opportunities for current and future educators," Dean of the VCSU School of Education Allen Burgad said. "We are very excited about the state of our technology literacy and STEM classrooms along with the new Children's Literacy Lab. These learning centers will provide tremendous learning opportunities and prepare our next generation of educators."

McCarthy Hall was built in the early 1930s and was used as a training school for prospective teachers attending VCSU. When the training school was closed, the building housed a wide variety of VCSU courses including technology education, art and psychology. The renovation of McCarthy Hall is a part of the first-ever capital campaign project at VCSU.

The \$13.5 million project is made possible through the generous support of donors, VCSU funds and \$11.5 million allocated by the North Dakota Legislature and approved by Gov. Doug Burgum.



Larry J. Robinson honored after more than 50 years of service to North Dakota

Valley City State University (VCSU) celebrated Larry J. Robinson on Monday, June 10, with an official program recognizing the naming of the Larry J. Robinson Center for the Arts.

Speakers during the program included President Alan LaFave, former president of VCSU Dr. Steven Shirley, and Valley City Mayor Dave Carlsrud. Robinson also addressed the crowd and offered thanks to his colleagues and family.

"I firmly believe no one in life accomplishes anything alone," Robinson said. "It takes a team."

His leadership in the North Dakota Legislature helped facilitate funding for a new Veterans' Home in Lisbon,

flood protection for communities in the Sheyenne River Valley and for the new VCSU Center for the Arts. The \$32 million building officially opened for students in the spring of 2022.

The Robinson Center for the Arts is the creative hub for all art and music on campus. The art facilities include a ceramics lab, printmaking, painting, and drawing studio, a woodshop, a photography studio and digital design lab. Music facilities in the building include a 350-seat performance hall, 100-seat choral room, a band rehearsal room, piano lab, recording studio and numerous practice rooms of various sizes.



2024 North Dakota Al Conference at VCSU in September

Valley City, ND – Valley City State University will host the 2024 North Dakota Al Conference organized by the Dakota Digital Academy. The conference will be on September 26, and will focus on "Being Human and Working in the Age of Al."

There will be keynote speakers leading research on AI and presentations about AI and humanity. The presentations will also feature hands-on opportunities to explore AI and networking opportunities with industry and education experts.

VCSU trap shooter brings home 1st in Male Singles Trap at state contest

The Valley City State University (VCSU) Trap Club competed in the North Dakota State Collegiate Trap Shoot on Saturday, April 27. Kaden Schafer, a freshman majoring in Fisheries and Wildlife Sciences, earned the title for 1st Place Male in Singles Trap with a 93/100 after a two-round shoot-off to break a threeway tie. VCSU's top shots for the day were Kaden Schafer, Logan Heen, Brooke Gaudry, Grant Larson and Derek Jacobs.

"It was great to participate in this event and compete against other collegiate level teams from our region," club advisor and professor Dr. Nick Galt said. "Trap is such a competitive sport and it's great to have high-level competitors to compete against."

"It was a windy day and I was glad to hit 93 in those conditions," Schafer said. "It always impresses me how much respect there is between competitors even in a high-stakes shoot-off."

This fall, VCSU will launch an intercollegiate Shooting Sports team for the first time in school history.







Presidential Service Awards

John Hill '73 and DuWayne Bott '58 were awarded the Presidential Service Award in June. "Both DuWayne and John have demonstrated their tremendous commitment to VCSU during their careers," President Alan LaFave said.

DuWayne has served on the Alumni Board, the V-500 Board and the Foundation Board for many years. "His support of VCSU has been exemplary," LaFave said. "DuWayne has also been a major contributor to the Forward Together Capital Campaign and made a difference in the lives of our students, faculty and staff."

John served on the VCSU Booster Board and Viking Scramble Committee. He and his late wife, Diane '73, supported the refurbishment of the track complex, which now bear their names.

"John has given his time, talent and treasure to support student scholarships and campus, including the Forward Together Capital Campaign," LaFave said. "We are incredibly grateful for his support and he is well-deserving.

2024 Spring Commencement

Valley City State University (VCSU) conferred 170 graduate and undergraduate degrees and three certificates or minors at the spring commencement ceremony on May 11, 2024.

The ceremony was the 132nd commencement ceremony at VCSU, and 153 undergraduate diplomas were awarded. This includes five Bachelor of Arts degrees, 62 Bachelor of Science degrees, four Associate of Arts degrees, 77 Bachelor of Science in Education degrees, five Bachelor of University Studies degrees, and one Minor.

"It's exciting to see our undergraduate students take this important step forward," Vice President for Academic Affairs Larry Brooks said. "Many of our graduates have accepted a job in their career field before they even walk across the stage. This is a great day to be a Viking."

The graduate degrees awarded included one Master of Arts in Teaching, 15 Master of Education, one Master of Science, and two certificates.

"Our graduates are top notch – we have many young professionals, who today, are ready to enter the workforce and make a difference," President Alan LaFave said. "VCSU attracts incredible students who excel in their academic careers, often times alongside athletics, student government, or other commitments. Valley City State University has announced Mark Nelson as the new Vice President for Student Affairs. Mr. Nelson has taken over for Dr. Erin Klingenberg, who retired this summer.

Nelson, originally from North Dakota, has more than 30 years of experience in higher education and an extensive background working at four-year residential universities, including Research I institutions. He comes to VCSU from Arapahoe Community College (ACC), part of the Colorado Community College System. He was the Executive Director of Advising & Retention. Nelson earned an Associate of Arts degree from Normandale Community College, a Bachelor of Science in Social Work, and a master's degree in Rehabilitation Counseling from Bowling Green State University.

"We are delighted to have Mark in the VCSU community. His vast experience in program development, campus collaboration, and dedication to student affairs will be invaluable as we continue to enhance the student experience at VCSU," President Alan LaFave said. "I am grateful for Dr. Klingenberg and her leadership in Student Affairs, and I am confident Mark will bring the same dedicated leadership and principles to his work."

Throughout his career, Nelson has demonstrated a strong ability to collaborate effectively with campus administration, faculty, admissions, financial aid, residence life, counseling, records and registration, and veteran's affairs, among other departments. He served on the College Care Team for behavioral intervention and threat assessment, focusing on the well-being of both



students and staff.

When the small things become big things

A Brotherhood of Success

Coach Jim Dew has been lauded for his success on the football and baseball field at VCSU, but his legacy of helping young athletes become hard-working, principled men, leaders and coaches is his real gift.



At first glance, Jim Dew may seem like an unassuming sports enthusiast with a penchant for sharing stories and laughs. As a retiree, he likes to play golf and attend football and baseball games. You can often find him in the stands cheering for the VCSU Vikings and chatting with old friends and athletes.

Just below the surface is an intense mix of competitive

spirit, attention to detail, organization, interpersonal relationship building skills and an ability to lead and encourage others. This is a man drafted as a catcher by the San Francisco Giants in 1966 but chose to play semi-professional football and coach in Wisconsin instead. Dew clearly dedicated his professional career to young athletes. During his time as a Viking, he amassed eight North Dakota College Athletic Conference football titles and five in baseball. He was inducted in three Hall of Fames including VCSU, Mayville State and Mount St. Joseph High School. After coaching for many years, he established a scholarship at VCSU to honor players who have passed away.

Jim Dew is an acclaimed coach, but his resume is superseded by the legacy of his mentorship. He dedicated his career to transforming young athletes into individuals of character and perseverance. Dew is notorious for demanding good manners, as well as hard work.

Putting Athletes First



One of those young athletes was Darin Loe. Loe grew up near Georgetown, Minnesota. After some conversations with the personable Coach Dew, Loe landed at VCSU to play as a quarterback, pitcher and occasionally as an outfielder. Loe's remarkable career as a dual athlete included 6,461 career passing yards and

two seasons as an All American. He watched firsthand as Coach Dew crafted a conference championship team in 1988.

"(Dew) was always very organized and really put athletes first over the course of his career," Loe said. "His little life lessons really stick out to me. He is a guy who wanted you to do your sport well and your life in the right way."

Loe graduated from VCSU and was drafted by the Seattle Mariners in 1989. He returned to North Dakota to earn a master's degree in athletic administration and went directly to Missouri. This spring he completed his 31st year of coaching, including 25 years of baseball at Northwest Missouri State. He has won almost 600 games and in 2018, Loe's baseball team won a conference title in a highly-competitive conference.

Loe ties his success back to building relationships with his recruits, just like Dew did with him more than 20 years ago.

"I think it starts with integrity. You always knew where you stood with coach," he said. "Any successful person starts with a high moral standard."

Carrying Lessons into Life



One of Loe's teammates, Steve Olson, also grew up in western Minnesota. Olson followed his older brother to the ballfield to play for Coach Dew. Steve Olson quickly learned that Coach expected hard work from players regardless of the season. From methodical rotations

at practice to batting practice under Lokken Stadium in January, playing baseball and football became a way of life for many.

"I always talk about (Coach Dew's) organization. The little detailed things he would do that allowed us an opportunity to score extra runs were really unique, and those are the things that I carried along with me," Olson said. But Coach also taught many lessons that didn't specifically relate to baseball. "How do you behave as a team? How do you handle yourself in a restaurant? He taught us that all of those little things are important."

Olson graduated in 1988 with three seasons of All-Conference honors in baseball and went on to coach baseball and football for many years. He spent 12 seasons at Michigan Tech University, five as the head football coach, and has now returned to VCSU athletics. Olson stays in contact with other alumni and teammates like Bruce Nelson.

Nelson was recruited in 1986 by Coach Dew to play football. During Nelson's time at VCSU, the team earned a NAIA National Playoff appearance after winning the conference championship. After playing for four years, Nelson stayed a fifth year to help coach and finish up his double major in Elementary Education and

Physical Education with a minor in coaching.

"Our team was well coached and everyone knew what their job was," Nelson said, but it was lessons off the

field that stand out in his mind. "It was

good human. It was about working hard and being a good sport. We knew how to win and how to lose. If wins happen, they happen but it was about doing things the right way."

Nelson, like others, spent time playing for Coach Dew and then working with him as a student coach before graduation. That experience prepared Nelson for years of coaching students in East Grand Forks and leading his 2024 high school football team to an undefeated season and a state championship in Minnesota 3A.

He also works as a principal at the high school and sees how critical having positive role models can be for students. Coach Dew always provided guidance when asked.


"I knew I could always give him a call, whether it was sports related or life related," Nelson said. "He would give me what advice he could and if he didn't know the answer he would somehow point you in the right direction."

Finding a Path

Steve Ouinn

Direction was one thing Steve Quinn was seeking as he approached his high school graduation. In typing class, he

wrote a paper about colleges and cities he had never heard of before. VCSU was on his list.




He sent film to Coach Dew and soon he was stepping off a plane in Fargo.

As he joined the team, Quinn learned from Coach Dew, but he also learned from other players empowered by Dew.

"I'll never forget my team captain during my junior year told me to get my head on straight if I wanted to be a player on this team," Quinn said. "I never worked so hard as I worked that summer. I stayed in Valley City and painted rooms at the college and worked out."

After months of hard work and sweat, Quinn got a note from Coach Dew that he still has today.


"He said he had never seen anyone work so hard at getting a position and was excited to see how this year was going to go," Quinn said. "It was the first time he told me I was going to be a big part of his team."



That year Quinn earned Honorable Mention All Conference and during his senior year the team earned a national playoff berth. He was a part of the 1988 team that made it back to

the national playoffs.

Although not a coach, Quinn followed his dream and began working for a football company and now he is running the largest football camp showcase company in the nation. Ouinn's Football University hosts 40



regional events for middle and high school athletes to workout with current and former NFL coaches and players.

"I didn't get into coaching, but I did the next best thing. I get to mentor kids and watch kids play football," Quinn said. Last season he had 47 athletes sign NFL agreements and hosted the top four quarterbacks in the All-American Bowl.


Quinn, like so many of Coach Dew's team members, is helping students grow and find success. "He taught me how to work and how to be a man," Quinn said of Dew. "He was always there for us, always checked on us and devoted his time for more than 30 years to his athletes. He is a builder of young men."

The Memorable Times

Many of the players were recruited by Dew or others in the old-fashioned way. Coaches traveled across the nation for in-person visits and phone calls to build strong interpersonal relationships that have lasted a lifetime.

For Dew, there were some very impactful seasons

in the 1980s. The 1980 team was considered an



"That's what the players were like," Dew said. "They were kids, but they gave of themselves. The big thing with those kids was that they wanted to be there and they wanted to have success."

Many players wanted to give back and helped by coaching a season or two at VCSU before graduation. The list of those that went on to successful coaching careers is astounding.

In three years of teams alone, 1986 to 1988, Dew graduated 10 individuals who became head coaches at the collegiate level. That group also resulted in five assistant college coaches, nine high school coaches with state championships and dozens of long-term successful high school coaches. One graduate, Dan Gnadt, went on to become a professional baseball umpire and advanced as far as the AAA level in his career.

Playing for a Coaching Legend



One of those collegiate head coaches was Todd Hoffner. He was a farm kid from Esmond, North Dakota and participated in every sport possible. He landed at VCSU and remembers meeting with the "charismatic" Coach

"If he doesn't know your name, he is going to say, 'Hey big guy,'" Hoffner said. "(Dew) was really good at being engaging and encouraging."

At the time, encouragement was something Hoffner needed. He didn't play his first two years, which was a departure from the amount of playing time he was used to

"Coach Dew definitely motivated me to be the best I could when it came to playing football. I wanted to prove I could play," Hoffner said. "Toward the end of the last two summers I trained and earned a spot."

Hoffner cites mentors as an inspiration and motivation for his success. He has coached for many years and currently is entering his 13th season as the head coach of the Minnesota State University - Mankato Mavericks. He

has taken the team to eight NCAA playoff berths and national championship games in 2014 and 2019. He has a 122-30 overall record with the

"Things I do today are a spinoff of anyone and everyone I've engaged with," Hoffner said. Learning how to be flexible, having second chances and trying harder to do better are things that Hoffner learned

"Jim Dew is a legend and always will be," Hoffner said. Hoffner will spend his fall preparing for another football

season, just like VCSU Assistant Head Coach Gregg Horner. Horner played for Dew during the famed 1988 season and worked as a student assistant coach for him as well. Near his desk in the W.E. Osmon Fieldhouse, he has a display of golf balls imprinted with some of Coach Dew's most well-known phrases.

"It's the small things," "Get Yer Lemon Drops," and "Hey BIG Guy," are just a few of the most well-loved standards. A group of former VCSU football players known as the

But for Horner, Dew's legacy is more than phrases enshrined on golf balls.

Dew's legacy is a vibrant example of the strength and value of relationships.

"The Oarsmen are where we are today because of the relationships Coach Dew and others have made and continue to make with their teams," Horner said. "He has an amazing legacy and is always around to support others."

Preparing Athletes For Life



Kevin Blaskowski knows how lifechanging support from Coach Dew can be. Affectionately known as "Lefty," Blaskowski grew up in Valley City and knew Dew from an early age. As a young college student and baseball player he was unsure of what career path to pursue, and changed his major three

times.

"Coach finally told me I needed to be a coach," Blaskowski said. "He knew what I was capable of doing and he saw us where we were at. He is the one that mentored me in becoming a coach and then gave me an opportunity to coach with him."

Blaskowski has now been coaching for more than 30 years, including 25 of those at the collegiate level. He has a podcast where he shares thoughts about the game, and many lessons including some from Coach Dew.

"I owe that man a lot," Blaskowski said. "I realize how much he really cared about all of us and how much he wanted us to be more than just successful on the baseball field. That has been the basis of my coaching. Yes, the game is important but it has a bigger purpose and that is preparing us for life."

Blaskowski was recently inducted into the VCSU Coaches Hall of Fame and credits Coach Dew for setting him in the right direction.

"He did what he did because he believed in us," Blaskowski said. "He taught us how important the little things are and part of me as a coach did not want to let him down. When he stepped on the field, it didn't matter who was in the dugout. He expected us to win and believed we could win."

The proof is in the accolades. Dew's athletes have created playbooks of success and will continue to grow the branches of his coaching tree for generations.

VCSU joining Frontier Conference

Since August of 2023, with the announcement of Waldorf and Viterbo leaving our conference, we have felt very unstable about our future. We've spent many hours trying to figure out the right path for us to move forward and get back on solid ground. It is a relief and exciting to finally have a stable home in the Frontier Conference for the foreseeable future of Viking Athletics. Many

challenges still face us but now we can start

to build a better structure when the ground we are standing on is stable. We look forward to setting a new direction for our Viking Ship to sail when we join the Frontier Conference in 2025-26. Read more about our plans below.

VCSU to move with four other NSAA schools

Valley City State University and the Frontier Conference announced on May 21 that VCSU will join the athletic conference starting in the fall of 2025.

VCSU's athletic teams will compete for one more season in the North Star Athletic Association before joining the Frontier Conference for the 2025-26 season. The Frontier Conference – currently made up primarily of NAIA schools in Montana – is regarded among the top leagues in the NAIA and gives VCSU immediate stability for its athletic programs after a tumultuous few years in the NSAA.

The Vikings are making the move with four other NSAA schools. The Frontier Conference also announced the additions of Dakota State University, Mayville State University and Bellevue University on May 21. Dickinson State had previously announced it was joining the Frontier Conference starting in 2025-26.

"We're excited for this new adventure with a well-respected and highly competitive conference in the NAIA," said VCSU athletic director Dennis McCulloch. "With our five NSAA schools making the move together, the conference can get creative with scheduling to help lessen the anticipated increase in travel time and costs."

"The daily competition we'll face in the Frontier is a challenge that our programs will be forced to rise to," said McCulloch. "With support from our campus and a passionate fan base, we're confident we can elevate our programs to become more competitive nationally as a member of the Frontier."

Within the last two years, the North Star Athletic Association has slowly de-stabilized with two schools closing – Presentation College and Iowa Wesleyan – and two schools leaving for other conferences: Waldorf University and Viterbo University. That forced the remaining NSAA schools to look for homes elsewhere with the conference dropping to just five members.

"We are excited to join the Frontier Conference and I am looking forward to seeing many of our long-standing competitors as well as some new faces," VCSU President Alan LaFave said. "Keeping the five NSAA schools together helps to preserve traditional rivalries for our students, alumni and fans. As with all large decisions at VCSU, we evaluate how options will affect student experiences. I'm certain this move will enhance and elevate the experiences of our athletes and supporters."

The Frontier Conference currently sponsors 12 sports, including football, women's volleyball, men's and women's cross country, men's and women's basketball, men's and women's indoor and outdoor track and field, and men's and women's golf. With the addition of the five NSAA schools – who all play baseball and softball – the Frontier Conference will also likely begin sponsoring baseball and softball as an official conference sport in the coming years.

The Frontier Conference currently has six full membership schools and four associate member schools in football only. Starting in 2025-26, the conference now projects to have 11 full member schools and a total of 14 football-playing schools.

SPORTS RECAP



The Valley City State University baseball team finished third in the conference standings this season during their first year under new head coach Alec DeMaria.

The Vikings finished with a 21-33 overall record and an 11-13 mark in conference play as they earned the No. 3 seed for the postseason. Valley City State won its first two postseason games before being eliminated from the conference tournament with another third-place finish.

"We still have a long way to go to achieve what we want to accomplish, but our coaching staff and players feel like we really got things turned around this year," said DeMaria, who took over as head coach last summer.

VCSU's pitching staff set a new school record with 494 strikeouts this season, shattering the old team record by 135. A highlight of the season included a four-game series sweep over Mayville State in April. The Vikings finished the season with a 7-0 record against the Comets.

Junior starting pitcher Hunter Magnuson earned 1st Team All-Conference after leading the NSAA with 105 strikeouts in 79.1 innings pitched.

Freshman pitcher Takao Cookson, junior shortstop Jaden Babiuk and freshman catcher Jamel Chabot were all named 2nd Team All-Conference. Cookson was also named the North Star Athletic Association Freshman of the Year after posting a 2.96 ERA in 67 innings pitched.

Sophomore pitchers Christopher Dietrich and Connor Nelson both earned Honorable Mention All-Conference.

Golf Update

The Valley City State golf teams competed in four tournaments this spring, including its own VCSU Spring Invite where Sydney Carlson earned individual medalist honors. Carlson (81-81) paced the VCSU women to a season-best 342 team score on Day 2 of the VCSU Spring Invite. The men also carded a season-low round 308 at CrossRoads Golf Course in Carrington, led by Grant Inniger's career-low 70 (-2).

The Vikings also competed at the Dakota Wesleyan Spring Invite and the Dickinson State Spring Invite before competing at the NSAA Championships which was hosted by Viterbo University at The Golf Club at Cedar Creek in Onalaska, Wis.

VCSU golfers Sydney Carlson and Kathleen Vetter each earned Honorable Mention All-Conference after placing in the Top 14 at the NSAA tournament. Vetter finished in ninth place at the NSAA Championships after firing a 168 (84-84), the best conference finish by a VCSU women's golfer since Jocelyn Braunberger's ninth place finish in 2019. Sydney Carlson moved up eight spots after firing a final-round 82 to secure her second career All-Conference honor. Carlson finished with a two-day 180 (98-82) to place 14th overall.

VCSU's golf teams each placed fifth out of six teams at the NSAA Championships. Senior Grant Inniger was the top finisher for the Viking men with a 164 (81-83) to tie for 17th place.

Sydney Staus and Henrik Jacobsen were each named Champions of Character, which recognizes the student-athletes who best represent the NAIA's five core values of integrity, respect, responsibility, sportsmanship, and servant leadership.

Softball advances to postseason play

The Valley City State softball team finished the 2024 season with a 28-22 overall record and earned a No. 2 seed for the NSAA Postseason Tournament after going 17-6 in conference play. The Vikings fell to top-seed Bellevue University to end its season at the double-elimination NSAA Tournament.

Valley City State led the North Star with 10 All-Conference nods this spring. Eight Vikings earned 1st

Logan Gronberg, a sophomore transfer, led the NSAA with a .430 batting average while Sierra Crocker led the conference with 46 RBIs on the season. The pair tied for second in the NSAA after smashing eight home runs each. Zander finished the season ranked second in the conference with 123 strikeouts in the pitcher's circle for VCSU.

The Vikings finished the season atop the conference in team batting average (.333), total hits (459), doubles (74), home runs (36), RBIs (267), on-base percentage (.392) and slugging percentage (.480).

Senior catcher Sierra Crocker finished her Viking career with school records for career home runs (34), doubles (59), RBIs (206), and slugging percentage (.630). Pitcher Joelle Lamontagne ended her career ranked third in school history for wins (46), sixth in career strikeouts (298), and fourth in complete games (36).





Odegard and Peraza earn All-American honors

Kendra Odegard and Jaiden Peraza both earned All-American honors this season to highlight Valley City State University's outdoor track and field season.

Peraza – a sophomore from Kindred, N.D. – placed fourth in the nation in men's high jump, clearing a personal-best 2.08 meters (6 feet, 9.75 inches) at the NAIA Outdoor National Championships in late May.

Odegard – a junior from Lisbon, N.D. – placed 6th in the women's javelin with her throw of 41.84 meters (137 feet, 3 inches) at the NAIA



National Meet. Odegard had the farthest throw in the entire NAIA this season with her personal-best throw of 46.55 meters (152-9) at the NSAA conference meet.

VCSU junior Sadie Hansen also qualified for nationals in

the javelin and placed 26th in the nation.

At the conference level, the Vikings won two individual conference titles and had 14 All-Conference (Top 3) finishes. Freshman Aaron Cutshall won the men's long jump conference title (6.88 meters) and Odegard won the women's layelin.

VCSU's women scored 103.75 team points at the conference meet and placed fourth out of six teams. The Viking men scored 82 points and took 5th out of six teams.



President Emeritus Charles Brewer House Jr.





On April 7, 2024, Charles Brewer House Jr. died peacefully in Santa Rosa, California. He was 96 years old. His optimism, his sense of humor, his intellectual curiosity, and above all his genuine love of life, are memories that will live on long after his passing, cherished by all who knew him. Charlie was born on June 24, 1927, in Galesburg, Illinois. He loved the life on the farm, and attended the University of Nebraska. It was here that he was finally able to pursue his love of learning, and it was also here that he found June, the true and lasting love of his life. After college, he spent three memorable years serving his country in the Pacific, before and during the Korean War, and on April 9, 1950, Margery June

Hornby became his wife. Their love affair continued until the day he died, a marriage lasting more than 73 years.

House earned a master's degree from Princeton Theological Seminary, and a move to Grand Rapids, Michigan began his career as a clergyman and a theologian. He then moved to Alma College in Alma, Michigan to work as a teacher and lecturer. By this time he was also the head of a family which included 5 sons, an unruly brood that frequently caused him great consternation.

His appointment as head of the Department of Humanities at the University of Nigeria, Nsukka faced him with one of his greatest challenges yet, to which he rose admirably, establishing the first African Studies curriculum in the newly independent nation. His tenure as a lecturer, administrator, and cultural ambassador in Nigeria was abruptly cut short at the outbreak of the Biafran war of independence.

Returning to the US, the family relocated to Michigan State University in East Lansing, Michigan, where he resumed his career as a dedicated teacher. He earned his doctoral degree in Education. House joined the faculty of Central Michigan University, in Mt. Pleasant, Michigan.

In 1983, he began his tenure as President of VCSU. Under his leadership, VCSU emerged as a leading small institution of higher learning. In the vast open spaces of the prairie, he led efforts to transform isolation into connectivity, anticipating the power of long-distance learning in the pre-internet era.

After retiring from this position in 1993, he and June made the transition to a home in the woods of northern Minnesota. He was able to pursue his love of sailing, woodcarving, and carpentry, playing the organ, and, as always, faithfully following the fortunes of his beloved "Cornhuskers" on the gridiron. In 2014 he and June relocated one last time, to Santa Rosa, California, to be closer to family in their later years. He died peacefully on April 7, 2024. He was 96 years old.
