4 Foundation finalizing plans for first-ever campaign

The VCSU Foundation is finalizing plans for its first-ever capital campaign. The \$25 million effort includes four components: an addition to the W.E. Osmon Fieldhouse with a turf practice field and indoor track, student scholarship enhancements, the repurposing of McCarthy Hall as a new home for the School of Education and Graduate Studies, and a renovation of the Student Center to create a multipurpose space from the old pool area.

IRA Charitable Rollover



There is a way for you to support the mission of the VCSU Foundation that you may not have heard about. It's called the IRA charitable rollover, and it's a way you can make a gift to support our cause and save on taxes this year.

If you are 72½ or older, you can use the IRA charitable rollover to help charities like us complete our important work. The IRA charitable rollover allows you to meet your required minimum distribution (RMD) requirement by directing your distribution to charity rather than taking it yourself.

HERE'S HOW IT WORKS:

1. Call your IRA administrator.
2. Tell them you want to make an IRA charitable rollover gift to support our mission.
3. Direct the distribution to our nonprofit organization.

You can distribute up to \$100,000 to charity from your IRA each year to meet your RMD.

Consider using your IRA Required Minimum Distribution to fund an Endowed Scholarship.

For the IRA charitable rollover to work for you, it is important that you do not take the distribution. Ask your IRA administrator to make the distribution directly to our organization. While you will not receive an income tax deduction for your gift, you will receive the joy of knowing the full amount will go to support our cause.

It has been an exciting time at VCSU seeing our university family return to campus. We were fortunate to kick off our fall semester with students returning to campus and attending face-to-face classes in a safe manner, along with our athletes being able to compete in their respective sports.

Our enrollment continues to grow. The university recently announced we have set enrollment records with a total headcount of 1,676 students this fall term. We are thankful for our alumni and friends' past support; your support of our scholarship programs at VCSU has been key to growing our enrollment.

Our V-500 and Century Club scholarship programs have been successful marketing tools for the university in recruiting and retaining

students at VCSU. WHAT IS AN ENDOWMENT?

An endowment is a special fund in which the principal is invested in perpetuity and never used. The interest earnings support the annual scholarship allocation. Endowments are an excellent way to honor or memorialize a loved one, teacher, coach or your family.

The VCSU Foundation requires a minimum investment of \$10,500 to establish an endowment.

Donors can invest the funds all at one time, or make periodic contributions to the fund until such time that the \$10,500 minimum is met. Once the fund is established, contributions to the fund can continue into the future.

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Forward Together

Foundation finalizing plan for first-ever campaign



The Valley City State University Foundation is finalizing its plans for a \$25 million campaign, the first in its history.

Titled “Forward Together: The Campaign for Valley City State University,” the fundraising effort comprises four components: an addition to the W.E. Osmon Fieldhouse, additional funds for student scholarships, repurposing McCarthy Hall for VCSU’s renowned teacher education program, and a renovation of the Student Center.

According to Larry Robinson, executive director of the VCSU Foundation, the time is right for the foundation’s first campaign. “VCSU is committed to our students, and this campaign is crucial if we are to continue to serve their needs.”

The four campaign components break down as follows:

OSMON FIELDHOUSE ADDITION

- Indoor turf practice facility
- 200 meter indoor track
- Updated strength and athletic training
- New and expanded locker rooms
- Updated and expanded public areas
- Classrooms and meeting rooms
- Viking Hall of Fame



SCHOLARSHIP ENHANCEMENTS

- Keep scholarship allotment on pace with enrollment growth
- Maintain an accessible and affordable VCSU education
- Recruitment and retention of next generation of VCSU Vikings

MCCARTHY HALL REPURPOSE

- Conversion of the existing McCarthy Hall into the VCSU School of Education and Graduate Studies
- Cutting-edge classrooms and tech labs
- Collaborative student workspaces
- Attractive two-story atrium entrance
- Bridge corridor from McFarland Hall
- Updated instructional technology
- Updated mechanical, HVAC, and electrical systems
- Extensive exterior renovation

STUDENT CENTER RENOVATION

- Convert available square footage from pool closure into usable space
- Create banquet and meeting spaces for:
 - New student orientation
 - Career fairs and organizational meetings
 - Esports competition venue
 - Other student activities

May 16, 2020: VCSU hosts its first virtual commencement

To honor its 2020 graduating class, Valley City State University held its 128th commencement exercises virtually on Saturday, May 16, streaming the event on YouTube. At the ceremony, VCSU recognized 299 graduates – 261 bachelor's degree candidates and 38 master's degree students.

President Alan LaFave presided over the commencement exercises from Vangstad Auditorium, with assistance from faculty marshal Brenda Tyre, associate professor of business and president of Faculty Senate; Margaret Dahlberg, vice president for academic affairs; and Pete Smithhisler, vice president for student affairs.

In his remarks, President LaFave gave thanks to the parents, spouses and other family members of the graduates, as well as thanking the VCSU faculty and staff. Addressing the graduates themselves, he said, "You have all contributed to the culture and success of our university."

He shared two quotes – Nelson Mandela's "Part of being optimistic is keeping one's head pointed toward the sun, one's feet moving forward," and Warren Buffet's "Someone is sitting in the shade today because someone planted a tree a long time ago" – encouraging the graduates to focus on the positive future and asking them to consider how they can leave the world a better place than how they found it.

President LaFave closed with "Always remember VCSU, and come back and visit – we'll welcome you with open arms," and, of course, his signature phrase, "Go Vikings!"

Audience members also heard from Nick Hacker, chair of the North Dakota State Board of Higher Education, who brought congratulations to the graduate on behalf of the state board. "We celebrate together your hard work and dedication," said Hacker, who also told the graduating class, "We're confident you'll do well because you've proven you can work hard, think critically and show up."

In addition to his SBHE service, Hacker is CEO of Guaranty and Title Company, which provides title insurance and real estate closing services across North Dakota, Minnesota, Wisconsin and Montana.

Brandi Aranda gave the student reflection. A VCSU senior from Hitterdal, Minn., Aranda graduated with a bachelor's degree in athletic training. She had served the university as an R.A. and a Viking Ambassador, and also as a student athletic trainer and leader in the Athletic Training Club. In fall 2019, she co-chaired the student homecoming celebration. She received



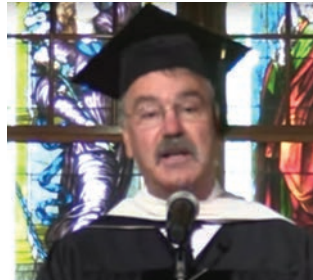

a Viking Pilot Award in recognition of her passion for and contributions to the student body and campus community.

"Never in my life did I imagine that I would be speaking to all of you like this today," said Aranda. She thanked those who helped her at VCSU: "Valley City State University has given me opportunity and opportunity again, and I will forever be thankful for each and every one of them," noting that on both good days and bad days, "There was always someone there for me."

Aranda encouraged her classmates to take pride in their accomplishments: "Graduates, look at where you're at. Look at how far you've come." And she closed with this advice: "No matter where you go, remember where you came from."

The faculty reflection was presented by Steven King, professor of social science, who began teaching at VCSU in 1998 and secured a tenure-track position in 2005. In 2019, he was recognized at the Dakota Conference at Augustana College with the Distinguished Contribution to the Preservation of the Cultural Heritage of the Northern Plains Award. Campus adviser for the Phi Alpha Theta History Honor Society, King was honored by VCSU's Student Senate as its 2020 Teacher of the Year.

Addressing the graduates, King said, "I hope we have challenged you. You, believe it or not, have challenged us. ...We are a bit different because you were here."

Prior to the ceremony, King had solicited remarks from the graduates via email, and he shared several statements of praise for VCSU and the campus community from members of the class of 2020. He, too, shared a quote, closing his remarks with words from Winston Churchill: "Success is not final, failure is not fatal: it is the courage to continue that counts."

Kim Svenningsen-Hesch '91, assistant director of university advancement, coordinated the commencement ceremony, and the technical crew that produced the event was led by Erik Kringlie '92, director for data centers and visualization.

Reopening this fall in the face of COVID-19

Spring break 2020 was a pivot-point for Valley City State University. As the coronavirus began to spread prior to break, university officials began meeting frequently to talk through plans to ensure the safety of the campus community and Valley City.

Faculty and staff began working from home in mid-March, and ultimately the decision was made to keep students home after break and deliver instruction via online technology. What started as a two-week trial period after break changed to a virtual campus for the remainder of the semester.

Throughout the spring and summer, the VCSU Emergency Management Team worked on plans to keep the campus and community safe. Employees began returning to work on campus in stages in July and August.

Plexiglass shields, signage and floor markers were installed as safety measures and aids for appropriate behavior and physical distancing. A policy mandating the use of face coverings in indoor public areas on campus was implemented. Microsoft Teams became the go-to virtual platform for meetings and conversations.

Plans were made to reopen the campus with face-to-face classes in August. Classroom seating was reduced to manageable capacities, and enhanced technology in the form of cameras and audio equipment was installed to provide synchronous virtual delivery of course instruction. Margaret Dahlberg, vice president for academic affairs, explained how this would work:

“This flexible approach will provide synchronous remote course access that keeps students and faculty engaged with everyone in the face-to-face course, whether they are remote or in person on any given day. The actual classroom is available virtually, using cameras and microphones to give the whole classroom experience, not just trained on the faculty presenter.

“Remote learners can participate — ask questions, respond to others, even make presentations to the class or attend a small-group meeting. The class is recorded, so those who cannot attend synchronously can watch the class at a later time, and those who need to check on something or who need to listen to part of a presentation a second time can do so.

“This will be an ongoing choice: Students can choose whether to attend in person or remotely on any given day.

Plans and procedures for isolation of positive cases and quarantine of close contacts were established and refined. Extensive cleaning and sanitization protocols for classrooms and other areas throughout campus were employed to ensure safe environments after each use cycle. Masks and hand sanitizers were purchased for distribution to all students and employees.

Frequent drive-through COVID-19 testing events have been held at the fieldhouse and the Winter Show, and students and employees have been encouraged to participate.

VCSU athletics have also been impacted, with the Vikings and North Star Athletic Association playing fall sports with later start dates for pre-season training and competition. Student-athletes and staff have been tested frequently as well, and protocols implemented to keep teams safe and healthy. Here, too, facilities have been routinely cleaned and sanitized between uses.

Meals in the cafeteria were changed as well. Seating capacity at any one time is limited, with dining hours extended to allow patrons to eat more safely with physical distancing employed. Grab-and-go portions are provided, and other items are served; students are no longer serving themselves to help make things safer.

Thus far the huge investment in planning and establishing safe procedures has paid off; the VCSU community has weathered the pandemic with few disruptions to its “new normal” operations.

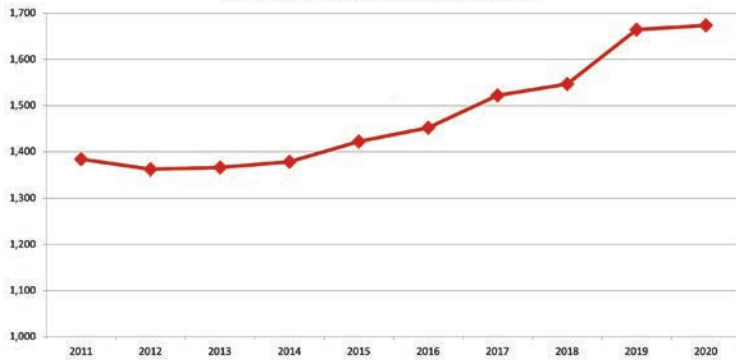
“Months of planning and preparation have gone into where we are today,” says President Alan LaFave. “While we can’t predict what the future will hold, we know that we’ve tried our best to enable us to serve our mission.

VCSU sets enrollment record for 6th consecutive year, headcount up 21% over decade

VCSU Headcount Enrollment, 2011-20



Valley City State University has set enrollment records with a total headcount of 1,676 students and an undergraduate headcount of 1,541, according to official fall term 2020 figures released by the university.

The 1,676 total headcount surpasses the previous record of 1,665 set in fall 2019, and the undergraduate headcount of 1,541 surpasses the previous record of 1,524, also from last fall.

The record headcount enrollment marks the sixth consecutive year of record-breaking numbers for VCSU, dating back to a fall 2015 mark of 1,422 that surpassed the previous record of 1,384 set in 2011. Over the decade beginning in fall 2011, VCSU’s headcount has increased by 21%.

“We’re very excited to share the news of our record enrollment,” said President Alan LaFave. “That count represents individual students, together with their families, who have actively chosen Valley City State University for their education. They are the reason we are here, and it’s the hard work of those students and our faculty, staff and alumni that continues to propel us forward together.”

Retention of full-time students from their first year to their second plays a large role in overall enrollment numbers; this fall’s cohort featured a 72% retention rate, VCSU’s second highest retention rate over the decade.

VCSU ranked 4th among public regional colleges in Midwest by U.S. News

Valley City State University has been ranked fourth among public regional colleges in the Midwest by U.S. News and World Report in its “2021 U.S. News Best Colleges” guidebook.

VCSU has now appeared in the U.S. News “Best College” rankings for 23 consecutive years, and the university has been ranked in the top five Midwest public regional colleges each year since 2010.

“We’re very proud of the students, faculty, staff and alumni of Valley City State University who have maintained a standard of excellence over time matched by few others,” said President Alan LaFave. “Rankings such as these provide credence and credibility to the notion we hold in our hearts and minds that VCSU is an exceptional place with extraordinary people.”

The U.S. News rankings are based on data including retention and six-year graduation rates, graduation rates for low-income students (based on federal Pell Grant recipients), measures of student excellence (high school class standing and ACT/SAT scores), the alumni giving rate and educational expenditure per student. A peer assessment by college and university officers also factors into the rankings.

The Midwest region comprises 12 states: North Dakota, South Dakota, Minnesota, Wisconsin, Michigan, Ohio, Indiana, Illinois, Iowa, Missouri, Kansas and Nebraska.

VCSU named a ‘Hidden Gem’ in the Plains region by College Raptor

Valley City State University has been named one of the 2021 “Hidden Gems in the Plains Region” by College Raptor, a college search platform that serves students, parents and counselors.

VCSU is one of 21 Great Plains schools selected as a “Hidden Gem.” College Raptor uses publicly available data to evaluate each college. Factors include first-year retention rate, median ACT/SAT scores for incoming freshmen, average faculty salary, student-to-faculty ratio, admission selectivity, endowment per student and four- and six-year graduation rates.

All data used in the College Raptor Best Colleges rankings is self-reported by colleges to the National Center for Education Statistics.

Center for Arts construction on schedule

Work on the Center for the Arts continues on the site west of the Student Center. Construction is on schedule for the \$32 million facility, funded by an appropriation from the 2019 North Dakota Legislature. The building, which will house the VCSU art and music departments, is scheduled to come online in January 2022.

A groundbreaking ceremony for the Center for the Arts was held June 24. University officials, along with community, regional and state leaders, gathered with representatives from the architectural, construction and site preparation firms to break ground on the project.

Speakers at the groundbreaking ceremony included VCSU President Alan LaFave; Roxanne Nelson, arts, community and education principal at HGA, architects for the project; Marc Mellmer, vice president of JE Dunn Construction; Dave Carlsrud, mayor of Valley City; and Angeline Gannon, VCSU Student Senate president. Wesley Wintch, VCSU vice president of business affairs and chair of the Center for the Arts Steering Committee, served as emcee.

“Given the situation with COVID-19, sometimes it feels like the world is standing still,” said President Alan LaFave. “We are not standing still at VCSU. We are moving forward; we are moving forward together. This ceremony today is an important milestone at the university, one that will help secure our future and a big step as we create a showcase for the arts for our students, the campus community and Valley City. Thank you to all who played a role in the planning and funding of the Center for the Arts.”

Art facilities in the new building will include a ceramics lab; printmaking, painting and drawing studios; a digital design lab; a digital photography studio; and a woodshop. An art gallery will provide a highly visible, secure space to showcase student and visiting artist exhibitions.

Music facilities will include a 350-seat performance hall, a 100-seat recital hall/choral room, a band room, a piano/computer lab, a recording and production studio, large and small practice rooms, and faculty offices/studios. Acoustic treatments have been designed for all performance, rehearsal and practice spaces, and the larger spaces feature adjustable acoustics and audio/video recording capabilities.

Gathering spaces will be found throughout the building, and a grand lobby will provide a reception area and showcase for the arts at VCSU.

Fall Sports Update

Football

The Viking football team had played three games through Oct. 10, posting a 3-1 record with wins against Presentation College and Waldorf University. VCSU's lone loss came at Dickinson State. The highlight of the early season was a thrilling 17-16 home win against Waldorf University. The Vikings are scheduled to play nine games – all conference contests – during the fall season. Due to COVID-19, the NAIA playoffs will be held in the spring, starting April 17.





Volleyball

Valley City State's volleyball team had posted a 4-9 overall record and a 3-3 mark in conference play through Oct. 10. The Vikings are in their first season under the direction of new head coach Brigitte Greywater, who previously coached at Lake Region State College. A highlight of the season so far was a 3-1 win against Waldorf University on VCSU's Senior Night. The Vikings are scheduled to play 15 matches this fall, and then will play 7 more matches in the spring. Due to COVID-19, the NAIA playoffs will be held in the spring beginning April 27.



Golf

Valley City State's golf teams were able to compete at six meets during the fall season. The Viking women won a dual with Dickinson State and had individual medalists four times. Jocelyn Braunberger (twice), Ashley McKittrick and Hayley Shanks all placed first at meets. The Viking men showed improvement throughout the season and shot their season-best round of 312 at their last meet of the fall. Freshman Rory Gentzkow has led the way with five Top 5 finishes. The Vikings will resume their season in early April.



Cross Country

The Viking cross country teams are in their first season with new coaches Laquone Robinson and Glen Ellingson. Through Oct. 5, the Vikings had competed at two meets. VCSU's men's team won the title during a Sept. 28 meet at Dickinson State University. The Vikings also had the top two collegiate individuals as Mason Wendt won the men's 8K race and Jasmine Barnes won the women's 5K. The NSAA conference championships will be held in November as previously scheduled, but the NAIA National Championships have been pushed back to April 9, 2021.



Baseball

Viking baseball had posted a 3-3 record through Oct. 5. The Vikings went 2-1 in three games with Mayville State, including a 3-0 shutout of the Comets. Valley City State went 1-2 in its three games against the University of Jamestown. The Vikings are scheduled to play a three-game series at Morningside College yet this fall, and then will resume their season in early March.

After an offseason of uncertainty, the Valley City State University basketball teams are gearing up to take the court again this fall.

Despite some schools and conferences delaying the start of their basketball seasons due to COVID-19, the Vikings are still on track to play games in late October. Both the men and women have been practicing for several weeks in preparation for the 2020-21 season.

Women's Basketball Preview

Valley City State women's basketball is looking to improve on last year's campaign heading into the 2020-21 season. The Vikings finished in fourth place in the North Star Athletic Association, ending the season with a 12-14 record overall and a 9-5 record in the conference. Head coach Vanessa Johnson begins her fourth year leading the Viking women.

The Vikings graduated two impactful seniors in Mackenzie Huber and Emily Schafer last season. Huber, named an All-American selection and first team all-conference, averaged 15.1 points and 7.2 rebounds per game. Schafer also played significant minutes for the Vikings, averaging 4.9 points and 3.3 rebounds per game.

Valley City State returns two seniors to the squad, including all-conference honorable mention Macey Kvilvang, who averaged 8.8 points per game last season, and Maara Nelson, who averaged 8.5 points per

game. The Vikings also return juniors Dani Schwanke (8.9 ppg) and sophomore Adriana Torres (8.4 ppg) who saw significant action last season.

The Vikings also welcome junior transfers Andranæ Powns and Neya Ulmer from Compton College and Emma Nielsen from North Dakota State College of Science.



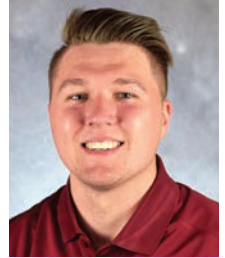

Men's Basketball Preview

The Viking men are looking to take the next step forward this year as the program enters its fifth season under head coach Ryan Montgomery.

After playing with a relatively young team the past few seasons, the Vikings return a strong corps of upperclassmen this season – including four seniors and two juniors who played the bulk of VCSU's minutes last season.

VCSU's top five leading scorers all return this season, including seniors Logan Nelson (14.3 ppg), Kevin Schramm (13.8 ppg), Connor Entzi (11.8 ppg) and Jalen Addison (9.8 ppg). Schramm was named second team all-conference last season as a post player, while Nelson earned honorable mention all-conference as a shooting guard. Nelson enters the season just 31 points shy of reaching 1,000 career points.

Juniors Chris Thompson and Hunter Sand are also back this year after playing significant minutes last season. They are joined in the junior class by three junior college transfer guards who appear poised to make immediate impacts: Tate Hebrink and Eddie Oyet from Riverland Community College, and Josh Kelly from Southwest Tennessee Community College.

The Vikings posted a 9-20 overall record last season, including a 5-9 mark in conference play.

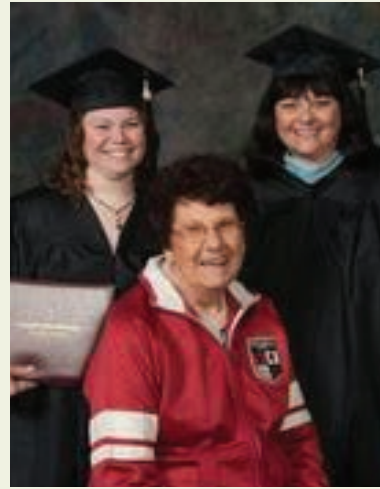

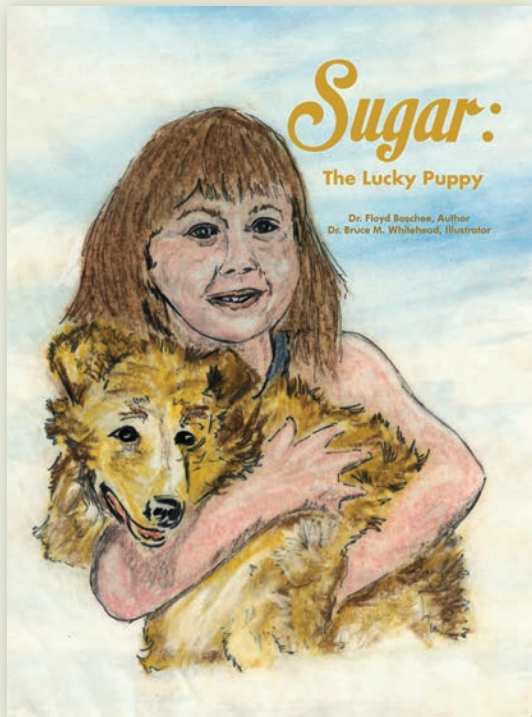

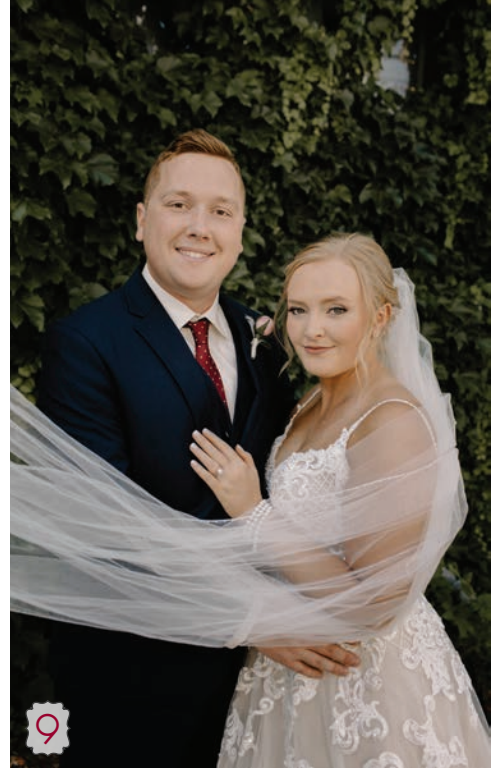

Obituaries of Former Faculty, Staff and Distinguished Alumni

Dorothy Enger

Born April 12, 1927, Dorothy Enger died June 6, 2020, at age 93. Born and raised in rural Hatton, N.D., Enger graduated high school in 1945 and went on to earn her teaching certificate from Mayville State College. She taught in rural schools in the Emerado and Hatton areas. In 1952, Enger began a 37-year career at Valley City State Teachers College, serving as an account technician in the business office.

Following her 1989 retirement, Enger moved to her new home in Mayville, where she spent the remainder of her years enjoying her home, entertaining family and friends, and serving at Little Forks Lutheran Church, where she had been baptized and confirmed, in rural Hatton. She is survived by three sisters and several nieces and nephews.



John Keller '55

John Keller, VCSU professor emeritus of business, died July 6, 2020, at age 89. Born in Harvey, N.D., Keller graduated from Goodrich (N.D.) High School in 1948 and attended summer sessions at Valley City State Teachers College (VCSTC) from 1948-51, teaching in rural schools during the school years. In the fall of 1951, Keller was inducted into the U.S. Armed Forces and served in the Korean Conflict. Following his honorable discharge

in 1953, he returned to VCSTC, completing a bachelor's degree in education with a composite major in business education and a minor in public school music in 1955. He was elected VCSTC homecoming king in 1954. He earned a master's degree in 1960 and a doctorate in education in 1973, both from the University of North Dakota.

Prior to joining the VCSU faculty, Keller taught in public high schools in North Dakota, including Sherwood, Velva, and Valley City, as well as three years in rural schools in Sheridan County. He also taught business education/administration courses at Mayville State University and at Dawson County Junior College in Glendive, Mont. Keller taught business at VCSU from 1968-93. He served as chairman of the Division of Applied Arts from 1970-90. He received the VCSU Distinguished Alumni Award in 1993 following his retirement.

He served as president-elect, president, and past-president of the North Dakota Business Teachers, Mountain Plains Business Teachers, and the Association of North Dakota College Teachers of Accounting. He was also a member of the Valley City Retired Teachers Association, Alpha Omega Phi, Delta Phi Epsilon, and the National Business Association. Keller was a member of the Valley Troubadours for 44 years, Valley City Eagles and Elks member for more than 30 years, and a member of the American Legion Goodrich for 65 years. He is survived by a sister Lois (Keller) Schell and several nieces, nephews, and great nieces and great nephews.

Norman Machart

Norman Machart of Walker, Minn., died April 1, 2020, at age 85. Machart was born July 14, 1934, near Lankin, N.D. He began teaching at age 17 in a one-room schoolhouse and continued to teach for the rest of his life. After serving in Germany as a member of the U.S. Army, he earned a bachelor's degree from Mayville State and began teaching elementary school in Crookston, Minn., where he met his future wife, Patricia. While raising their four children, Machart earned a doctorate from the University of North Dakota in 1977 and began the second

phase of his career as a college professor, training future educators. He served as professor at VCSU from 1984-97, teaching education and psychology courses. He received professor emeritus recognition following his retirement.

Machart enjoyed numerous hobbies, including painting wildlife and still-life artwork and making jewelry. He also enjoyed fishing, hunting and looking for arrowheads. A great storyteller, he loved sharing stories, real and imagined, with his children and grandchildren. He is survived by three sisters; his children, Thomas, Greg, Tracy and Carrie; and their families.

Gary Valiere '55



Gary Valiere of Reno, Nev., died Nov. 21, 2019, at age 89. Born on Feb. 24, 1931, in Valley City, he spent part of his youth in the Seattle, Wash., and Missoula, Mont., areas, but returned to Valley City.

A member of the Army National Guard, he was a Golden Gloves boxing champion and was part of the 1949 Valley City State football team which was inducted into the Viking Hall of Fame in 1989.

Valiere earned a bachelor's degree from VCSTC in 1955 with majors in math and chemistry and a minor in physics, a master's of business administration in finance from California State University in 1968 and a doctorate in psychology from United States International University - San Diego in 1980.

He married Delores Leick in 1951; they were married for 64 years until her death in 2015. They had four sons: Michael, Steve, Tom and Gary.

Valiere began his career working for Phillips Petroleum in north Texas. He and his family moved to Seattle, Wash., and Santa Barbara, Calif., before settling in Costa Mesa, Calif., in 1962. There he worked for Management Systems Corp.; Astronautics Co.; Douglas Aircraft Co.; McDonnell Douglas Corp.; Peat, Marwick, Mitchell and Co.; and Rex Land & Associates, among others.

In the 1970s his work as a consultant propelled him to start his own firms, beginning with Rigel, Inc. Next was Professional Education and Development, Inc., in 1982, which designed and delivered educational training programs for government agencies, universities, industrial firms, and public seminars. From there, he started Astro Vista Inc., an international consulting firm.

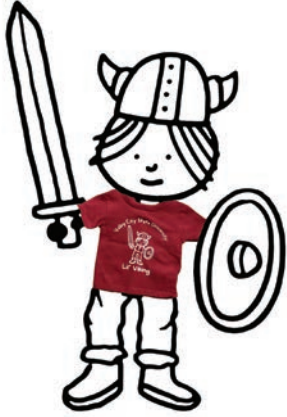
Valiere taught at USC, UCLA, Sierra Nevada College and the University of Nevada. He also served on the Scripps Clinic Research Council.

In 1985, Valiere received the VCSU Distinguished Alumnus Award from Valley City State University. In 2002, he gave the VCSU commencement address.

In the late 1980s, Gary and Delores moved to Lake Tahoe, Nev., to live in their vacation home. In 1998, they moved to Reno, where they spent the last years of their lives. In his later years, Valiere volunteered with SCORE (Service Corps of Retired Executives).

Valiere is survived by three sons — Steve, Tom and Gary (Michael died in 2016) — and their families, including seven grandchildren and nine great-grandchildren.
