It has been a busy and successful spring semester on the VCSU campus! From hosting more than 1,200 high school students for the EDC music contest and DECA

emerging leaders workshop, to bringing 40 employers on campus for a career fair and setting another enrollment record, we have had much to celebrate.

Enrollment is an important driver of continued success and stability but is also an indicator of the trust students and families are placing in the educational opportunities, attention to affordability, and career attainment made possible with a degree from VCSU. Spring 2024 enrollment numbers recently released confirm this. We are pleased to report record spring enrollments with 1,747 total students.

I'm so proud of our faculty and staff who continue to provide quality experiences for every student at VCSU. Their work has made this forward momentum possible.

Another quality indicator was recently reinforced with the release of the 2024 US News and World Report Best Online Programs. VCSU was recognized for having one of the best online bachelor's programs in the nation. Additionally, our online master's in education program was the only regional public institution in North Dakota included in the rankings. Our continued success and growth depend on meeting students where they are. By providing high-quality, affordable programs to students when and where they need them is one of the advantages and conveniences of our online offerings.

You may ask, do these ratings matter? The answer is YES! Just as fall enrollments have continued to set records, our spring enrollment headcount has increased by 35% since 2015! This is a unique upward trend that many universities are simply not experiencing in today's higher education landscape. We are so fortunate to have outstanding support from our community, friends and alumni who provide outstanding scholarship support.

Speaking of scholarship support, VCSU has always been an affordable option, but this spring we recommitted to that idea with the Viking Promise. As you may know, many neighboring schools and the state of Minnesota are finding ways to ensure college is affordable. We have always worked hard to keep tuition and fee costs low, and our donors have been exceptional in their support of students, making VCSU one of the most affordable high-quality education options in the state.

The Viking Promise matches what we have always done with a promise that students from ND, MN, SD, WUE and MSEP states who are full Pell eligible will have full-time tuition (12-13 credits) covered at VCSU for the '24-'25 school year.

This is just another step we are taking to help families navigate post-secondary education options. Thank you for your continued support and partnership.

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Headcount of 1,747 students paired with highest FTE during spring semester in school history

Valley City State University has set another enrollment record with 1,747 total students enrolled for Spring 2024. This includes 1,628 undergraduate students and 119 graduate students.

The semester also set a Full Time Equivalent (FTE) record at 1,148 FTE. The FTE increased from spring 2023 to spring 2024 by six percent. There was a total of 68 new students (freshmen and transfer students) enrolled at VCSU in the spring of 2024.

"We are thrilled to welcome so many new students into the Viking family. Enrollment growth is just one of the exciting developments at VCSU," President Alan LaFave said. "From the updates to McCarthy Hall, to our multiple rankings for excellence and affordability, it's clear that students and families recognize the outstanding quality, value and career opportunities associated with a degree from VCSU."

"Our campus community is moving forward and growing in ways that will benefit current and future generations," LaFave said. "Our faculty continue to invest their time and efforts to providing the highest-quality, accessible education for every student. Our staff have done a superb job supporting all aspects of our campus. I'm also grateful to our Viking alumni, supporters and community that help support students through scholarships, internships and in many high-impact ways."

"Enrollment growth is the result of the continued support and hard work of many, and we are grateful to have a supportive, thriving campus and community to call home," LaFave said.

VCSU's spring semester headcount has increased by 35% since 2015. Likewise, fall enrollment at VCSU has continued to set records.

"VCSU's programs continue to ensure our students find success and help meet workforce needs after graduation," Mr. Larry Brooks, Vice President for Academic Affairs, said. "We offer a wide variety of programs and it is an exciting time to be a part of VCSU."

VCSU Continues to Deliver Affordability with Viking Promise

Valley City State University (VCSU) announced a renewed pledge that ensures tuition is affordable for any student interested in earning an undergraduate degree.

The Viking Promise is a continuous effort from VCSU to alleviate the cost of tuition through financial aid and scholarship support. Currently, 95% of ND, MN, SD, WUE, and MSEP students who are Pell eligible have their tuition fully covered thanks to the combination of financial aid, scholarship dollars, and talent-based awards. Students from these states



who are full Pell eligible will have full-time tuition (12-13 credits) covered at VCSU for the '24-'25 school year.

In addition to FAFSA-related aid, VCSU offers the most attractive and significant scholarship program in ND. This ensures students have the ability to earn a degree at an affordable cost for their college career. These scholarships, partnered with financial aid, currently help 89% of partial Pell grant recipients reach full tuition coverage.

"We want every student to have the chance to earn a meaningful degree," President Alan LaFave said. "We are committed to helping students navigate college with our Viking Promise. We have one of the lowest tuition rates in the state of North Dakota and it's exciting to see what financial aid and generous donor support can do to impact our students."

"We provide strong financial support for our students and will continue to do so," Executive Director of the VCSU Foundation Cory Anderson said. "This is only possible through the support and generosity of our alumni and friends of VCSU."

In efforts to keep higher education affordable, VCSU's tuition rate for the 2024-2025 academic year will not increase for any student. The full-time tuition rate for North Dakota residents is locked in at \$6,619 a year.

Students living on campus can also access the Stay-and-Save Program that locks in the housing rate they paid as a first-year student through their graduation. The Stay-and-Save Program ensures students can budget for other costs associated with pursuing a degree.

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VCSU Receives Frank Murray Leadership Recognition from CAEP

VCSU was recognized for Leadership in Continuous Improvement by the Council for the Accreditation of Educator Preparation (CAEP). CAEP awarded the 2023 Frank Murray Leadership Recognition for Continuous Improvement to 21 educator preparation programs in 15 states and the United Arab Emirates. Winning schools provided evidence and data trends to achieve accreditation with no stipulations or areas for improvement.

"Once again our School of Education continues to stand out as one of the top teacher-educator programs in the nation," President Alan LaFave said. "Last year, our faculty and program were recognized as having no areas of concern and given full re-accreditation by CAEP. This is a significant achievement and reflects the high quality of our program."

CAEP has accredited 541 educator preparation providers in 43 states. The organization focuses on advancing equity and excellence through evidence-based accreditation.

"CAEP completed accreditation visits to 96 education preparation providers in 2023. VCSU appreciates being listed among the 21 institutions receiving the Frank Murray Recognition for Continuous Improvement. Our faculty prioritize helping every teacher candidate succeed in their content area, and this award reiterates the high-quality instruction and experience we offer," Dean of the VCSU School of Education Allen Burgad said. "Our focus on instruction and authentic field experiences helps our students become successful educators."

The Frank Murray Leadership Recognition for Continuous Improvement is named after the founding President of the Teacher Education Accreditation Council (TEAC). CAEP was created by the consolidation of the National Council for Accreditation of Teacher Education and TEAC.



U.S. News and World Reports ranks VCSU for Best Online Bachelor's and Master's in Education Programs

VCSU has been ranked again by U.S. News and World Report as having one of the Best Online Bachelor's Programs. VCSU was also recognized for having one of the Best Online Master's in Education programs.

VCSU was the only regional public university in North Dakota ranked as having a Best Online Master's in Education Program. VCSU was also the second-ranked North Dakota institution for online Bachelor's programs.

Faculty at VCSU are experts at delivering coursework via multiple formats and have regular and thorough quality and content reviews.

President Alan LaFave said, "VCSU's unwavering commitment to academic success is reflected in these rankings. Our faculty and staff are dedicated to providing our students with a valuable, affordable education that is competitive in today's world."

The U.S. News and World Report rankings are based on a variety of factors, such as student engagement, faculty credentials, and services and technologies.

2023 Winter Commencement

Valley City State University celebrated Winter Commencement Thursday, Dec. 14, in Vangstad Auditorium. 133 students earned their degrees this summer or fall, including 101 undergraduate recipients and 32 graduate students. 19 students were recognized for completing their bachelor's degree in three years.

"Graduates, I hope you have done this for yourself and that you are finding your purpose," student speaker Cora Potts said. "Be proud of yourself, of the challenges you have faced and conquered, for your future and for your dreams. We did it. We will forever be Vikings."

Jocey Braunberger was back on campus in February, not as a student, but as an employer with GoPromo during the annual Career and Internship Expo.

"We have only been out in Bismarck for two years, but we're growing," she said of GoPromo.

Braunberger graduated with a business administration degree and minor in marketing. She works out of the Bismarck office for the promotional materials company and enjoys partnering with customers on branding projects.

Hired in 2022 after doing an internship with GoPromo, Braunberger is enjoying getting to know her clients and helping connect them with new products or ideas.

"I like sales and the internship was a great way to give me an idea of what this type of work was like," she explained. "You don't really know what it entails until you are actually in the role. It was really awesome to be actually working with real clients."

Nearly 100% of 2022-2023 VCSU Graduates Report Being Employed or Pursuing Further Education

Valley City State University (VCSU) announced that 98% of all reporting graduates earning their degree in the 2022-2023 school year are either employed or continuing their education.

Of all reporting graduates earning an education degree, 62% are employed in North Dakota. The remainder are working or pursuing additional degrees in 19 different states from South Dakota to Florida to Alaska. The data was released as a part of the annual VCSU First Destination Report.

"Our graduates' success in their desired career fields shows the continued value of a VCSU degree," President Alan LaFave said. "The experiences students have at VCSU help prepare them for a fulfilling and productive career. Many go on to be important members in our North Dakota communities, and we are happy to support our state by offering affordable educational opportunities that lead to the success of communities and individuals."

"As I have worked through my first year of teaching, I can confidently say that VCSU helped prepare me to be a successful, well-prepared, and effective teacher in so many ways," Spring 2023 Elementary Education graduate Mariah Topp said. "One of the strongest pieces of the VCSU Education Program is the amount of hands-on teaching experiences. Teaching is a profession that improves with practice, and I was provided with a large amount of exposure through hands-on experiences and mentorship from seasoned educators I observed."

Alumni earning undergraduate degrees in other areas (non-education) reported 98% employment or continuing education status. Of all reporting non-education graduates, 70% employed indicated they are employed in North Dakota, and 52% of graduates continuing their education are enrolled in a North Dakota school. During that same timeframe, 32 students completed internships with a variety of businesses and organizations.

"Double majoring in psychology and human services provided me with the background knowledge I needed to pursue a Master's degree in Clinical Mental Health Counseling," Kasen Anderson, Human Services and Psychology Graduate, said. "After interning with the Abused Persons Outreach Center and the Community Green Dot program, I felt even more prepared for my future. I will forever be thankful for my time at VCSU, the people I met, and the opportunities I had and continue to have because of my time there."

One hundred percent of reporting graduates that earned a Master's degree indicated they were gainfully employed, 74% of them in North Dakota.

"Our graduate programs help individuals expand their horizons through education," said Dr. James Boe, Dean of Graduate Studies. "With graduate programs for those in education and a Master of Science in Business Information Systems, the programs we offer have helped many people achieve their career goals."

"When I decided to make the change from being a stay-athome mother of three children to pursue a career in teaching, I was excited but also overwhelmed. I felt well equipped in my subject area but ill equipped in my knowledge of structuring a classroom environment. Each of my classes in the Master of Arts in Teaching (MAT) program at Valley City State University added pieces to the puzzle that I was missing," recent graduate Cherise Pfaff said. "My professors were engaging and actively involved in my success. I began teaching as I was completing my degree, which allowed me to implement the strategies I was learning in real time. By the end of the program, I had all the information I needed to be an effective teacher. Through this program and my experiences in my own classroom, I have fallen in love with teaching and plan to continue for years to come."

The First Destination Report is published by the VCSU Career Services Department. It is developed following the standards of the National Association of Colleges and Employers (NACE).

DECADES OF EXPERIENCE Lives of Service

Dr. Erin Klingenberg and Larry Robinson '71 have served the students and university for more than 80 years combined. As they approach retirement, they reflect on the value of relationships and how that focus has continued to be the center of the flywheel of campus life at VCSU.

The people of VCSU are a special group that inspire loyalty. This trait is clearly demonstrated by two of the most recognizable faces on campus, Larry Robinson and Dr. Erin Klingenberg. Combined, they have served the university for more than 80 years. Their tenure at VCSU has seen seven university presidents at the helm, the addition of laptops for every student, numerous remodeling projects and the construction of the new Center for the Arts.

Both will be turning the page this summer and moving into retired life, but before they hand the reins over to new leadership, they sat down to reflect on changes in higher education, their experiences and some of the friends and family who have been along for the ride.

Connecting People Across North Dakota

One of Larry Robinson's most notable strengths is his ability to connect with people. As a North Dakota Senator for more than 30 years, he built numerous relationships with constituents, communities and other legislators.

As a staff member at VCSU, his connections with students, faculty, staff and alumni that spans almost 50 years. Robinson's service and dedication to connecting people will be recognized as the newly-constructed \$32 million Center for the Arts will bear his name. "This is a befitting honor in recognition of

his extensive contributions to our campus, community and state at the conclusion of

his 49-year career at Valley City State University. His career, achievements, and legacy are worthy of this recognition," President Alan LaFave said.

Robinson's life's work of connecting people started as one of five brothers in Tappen, N.D. As a high schooler, he found a mentor in his band teacher and VCSU graduate Myron Sommerfeld '62. Sommerfeld planted the seed of a lifetime and Robinson first arrived on campus 56 years ago. One of his first memories is how imposing and intimidating the clock tower seemed.

"So much has changed here in terms of the physical campus and the academic programming," he said. "One thing that has remained constant is our focus on students. We have always been a school that if you fall down, someone will pick you up."

Professors like Thilda Vangstad '29 and Larry "Buck" Grooters '57 helped lift Robinson up when he needed it the most. That support launched him into life on campus and he joined the EBCs, the student education association, marching band and

"Little did I know that I was going to end up the Editor-in-Chief of the paper and she had to listen to me," Robinson said of his future wife. "That was the last time she ever listened to me," he added with a laugh.

After graduation, the Robinsons got married and

were both offered jobs in Warwick, N.D. One day the VCSU dean of students stopped by Warwick and asked Robinson if he would be interested in running the Student Center. Phil Mueller '68, was serving as the director of the Student Center, but was taking a similar job in Montana. VCSU needed the right person. That person was Larry Robinson.

Robinson answered the call and he and Mary Lee returned to their alma mater in 1975. What started as a job running the Student Center morphed multiple times into a wide range

of activities from scrubbing floors, managing the swimming pool and being the hall director in Mythaler Hall.

"I didn't get any sleep that year," Robinson said. His time in the Student Center and housing morphed into other responsibilities and in 1996, Dr. Ellen Chaffee hired him to direct the VCSU Foundation.

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"He is a friend maker and friend raiser," Chaffee said. "His authenticity cannot be underestimated. I would say his signature characteristic is loyalty. Robinson's dedication to VCSU, work ethic, enthusiasm and communication skills helped lead the

> Foundation to success," she said. In the 1980s, state coffers were tight and Robinson had concerns about efforts to slash budgets. He thought about running for the Legislature in 1986 and lost by 17 votes to two popular incumbents. Quitting is not on Robinson's resume, so in two years, he

ran again and was first elected to the North Dakota Senate.

His work ethic and enthusiasm led the way and eventually he helped convince Phil Mueller to run along with him on the District 24 democratic ticket. The pair served together, in separate chambers, for 14 years.

"Larry has a healthy understanding of the issues, but also the way people work," Mueller said. "He finds the right people and has a way of working with them to solve real problems. He could find the people that could help, and then convince them to help."

Robinson was never afraid to stand up and speak his mind, fellow legislator and VCSU alum Sen. Joan (Leichtman) Heckaman '67 said. "He had the knowledge and was accepted by both sides of the aisle," she said. "He was good at making sure amendments were brought forward in committee to make a bill the best piece of legislation he could," she said. "The world would be so much better if we had more Larry and Mary Lee's in our lives."

His years in Bismarck had profound and wide-spread impacts for the entire state. In 2005, Robinson sponsored a bill to offer treatment for individuals using methamphetamine. The bill successfully passed and established a 20-bed facility in 2006 named the Robinson Recovery Center. Two years later, Robinson helped find a way to fund a new Veteran's Home in Lisbon.

Between sessions, in February 2009, Mary Lee (Peterson) Nielson '79 was serving as mayor of Valley City. The community was staring down a fear-inducing flood forecast. Nielson knew Robinson as the director of the Foundation but had never worked with him in his role as a lawmaker. Sandbags, volunteers, planning and luck helped the floodwaters pass with minimal damage, but Robinson and Nielson began working closely together to find a solution to the serious risk floodwaters posed to the entire community. Robinson helped other leaders see flood protection was a regional problem for the Sheyenne Valley.



"When we were working on permanent flood protection, we were working together as a community," Nielson said. "Larry was always working to help everyone get what they needed. It wasn't just Valley City that he was looking out for either. He was good for the entire Sheyenne Valley."

That approach was something current mayor Dave Carlsrud appreciates about Robinson's approach as well. When flood protection efforts progressed enough to place Foss Hall on the wrong side of a permanent flood wall, Robinson had marshaled enough support to fund a new Center for the Arts to house all art and music classes on campus.

"He had people from every corner of the state working to help support Valley City State," Carlsrud said. The bill passed and the Center for the Arts was built. Within months, it will bear the name of one of it's staunchest cowboy-boot sporting supporters."

"This place hasn't been a job for me, it's really been my life," Robinson said.

Her education degree landed her a teaching job in Butte, N.D. She said she would never go back to school, but three years later her husband Mel was going to graduate school at UND and she jumped into the Physical Education masters degree program with a minor in counseling.

Mel had an opportunity to teach and coach at Newburg High School and Erin started as a coach and faculty member at NDSU Bottineau, now known as Dakota College at Bottineau. As their family grew, the Klingenbergs took a leap of faith and took jobs in Valley City, Mel at

the High School and Erin as a softball and volleyball coach and faculty member at VCSU to fill a one-year leave of absence. The fall of 1991, Klingenberg was hired as the Director for Counseling

Services & Student Activities. This began her duties among many different responsibilities with the Counseling Services being the constant throughout. Since that move

decades building strong, meaningful connections with students, faculty, staff, community members, and friends.

Dr. Alan Olson '84, professor of education, started on campus the same week Klingenberg arrived. The pair both coached, taught and often interacted as they helped students navigate college.

"She is a great role model as a learner," Olson said, adding that Klingenberg's empathy, listening and kind heart made her an

"She is great at working with students and faculty and is a really good counselor. People feel comfortable coming to see her because she will meet them where they are at. You can just see that she was positive for so many people."

After working at VCSU for a handful of years, Klingenberg finished her master's degree in counseling and was hired to provide counseling services and lead student activities. One of

the students on her activities board was Kari Stricklin '92. They got to know each other at various events, and when Stricklin graduated, she stayed in touch. When she was hired to run the student center and direct student activities, Klingenberg was someone she could always count on to listen and stick by her side.

"She has always been a great resource at work, but also a great friend in life," Stricklin said. "She is someone you can always count on being in your corner. She's not the loudest person in the group, but she is dependable and very observant."

Klingenberg's ability to connect, see the unseen and support others has impacted many, including Stricklin.

"Sometimes she can recognize something before you even recognize it," Stricklin explained. "She is very perceptive and she is a colleague, friend but more like family. I know she would do anything for me and in return, I would do the same for her."

Through her career at VCSU, Klingenberg often relied on her counseling skills to help her coworkers and students succeed. She decided to enhance those skills and jumped on the chance to pursue her Ph.D. when approached by one of her former graduate school professors.

She earned her Ph.D., and eventually was hired as the Vice President for Student Affairs. Klingenberg credits her professional success to the strong support of her family.

"They are my foundation," she said. "I hope I have been able to be a model for students but also for my children and grandchildren."

As she approaches retirement, Klingenberg is proud of her work in Student Affairs and appreciates how the campus community rallies around students during this pivotal time in their lives.

"I really appreciate the opportunity given to me by President LaFave to allow me to lead the Student Affairs team. Our directors are some of the most competent, wonderful people that I have ever worked with on a team. As a team, we moved Student Affairs forward and increase the awareness of how this area fits into higher education in a big way," she said. "Students spend most of their time out of the classroom, and a strong Student Affairs team plays a critical role in their success."

She also reflected on the increasing importance of counseling in the university setting. Receiving counseling services is more

accepted than ever before and families have an expectation that counseling services are available.

"I've always said that asking for help is a sign of strength," she explained. "I always tell clients and students that you could do this alone, but the beauty is you don't have to."

Her work has helped numerous students at VCSU to thrive and succeed at a critical time in life. In addition to her counseling work, Klingenberg is proud of the robust and highly-skilled counseling team that exists at VCSU today.

"I think our counseling is solid here. What we have is a real gem," she said. "There are a lot of campuses that do not have services as readily available as ours. We are planting seeds. I have had a student come back and tell me that because they came to counseling, they are alive today. Can you have any better compliment than that?"

Art Through Carpentry

Meet VCSU Alumni and campus carpenter, Ryan Boll '00.

In many offices across campus this fall you could find small pieces of wood with distinct VCSU Viking heads emblazoned on the varnished surface. These 247 beautiful hand-crafted ornaments are made from vintage wood paneling from the original construction of VCSU's campus by Ryan Boll, campus carpenter and VCSU alumni.

Boll's passion for woodworking and carpentry was what brought him to VCSU in the 90's. He initially enrolled with the simple goal of getting a degree. But droams can take on

dreams can take on different shapes and Boll found his interests drawing him closer to the arts. This selfproclaimed "McCarthy third-floor nerd" got his

start in the arts building sets for the theater department to pad his GPA while earning his degree. From there, he got to know other students in the art department; the very next semester he joined the Art Department as a fine arts major. He later graduated with two degrees: A degree in fine arts he earned as an undergrad in 2000 and a second degree in art education he later earned in 2007 when his combined passions for woodworking and education lead him to becoming a shop teacher.

After earning his second-degree, Boll's path had a few interesting curves. He worked with the ceramics program in the old art facilities on campus. Then in 2022, VCSU restructured some positions within facilities and Boll's dream job opened. He immediately applied to be the carpenter on campus and it has been a whirlwind of work ever since. Ever-humble, Ryan claims he only "drills holes here and there," but evidence of his work can be seen all over campus. When he isn't running around fulfilling work orders on the clock, he is still doing his favorite thing: "making stuff." As a woodworker, Ryan's personal projects mostly include wood carvings done with his home CNC machine, but he also delves into the world of metal work, leather work, and fur hat crafting. Ryan brings his art to craft fairs to sell but he's just as likely to gift his smaller pieces, like the VCSU wood ornaments, to

his pals and the community on campus.

When asked if Ryan still uses the skills he learned as an art student in both his professional and personal work, he replied, "In art, they

don't teach you how to draw, or paint, or sculpt. You can either do that or you can't. What they really teach you is how to learn and how to solve problems. I use that every day." The most important thing he learned was, "I learned how to learn."

Learning how to learn goes beyond the classroom, Boll explained. A student learns from every experience, every relationship, every moment, "The experiences you have are what you learn from, whether you know it or not," he said. "It isn't something you sign up for- it just happens. The fun is in the engagement. That'll stay with you for the rest of your life."

Campus carpenter and artist, Ryan Boll is a lifelong Viking. His work on campus is many years in the making and shouldn't go unrecognized. So, if you're still making your way towards learning how to learn, don't hesitate to stop and say hello.

Forward Momentum: The Coming Years Promise

It is an important time in Viking Athletics. Many schools will tell you that, but for us, that statement rings very true right now as we undergo a conference affiliation change and position ourselves for the future.

Our current conference – the North Star Athletic Association (NSAA) – will be dissolving after the 2024-25 season. Our options as we look to move forward are staying in the NAIA and join the Frontier

Conference for the 2025-26 season – for which they have extended an invitation – or look at changing our national affiliation to NCAA DII or DIII. There are challenges & opportunities with all three options, and we are currently working on a decision that will be the best for all our athletic programs for the next 20 years and beyond.

We have hired a consultant to evaluate VCSU and Viking Athletics for its viability to move to NCAA DII. That process with the consultant began this winter and we will have answers this spring. In the meantime, we will proceed with finding a conference home and continue to have conversations with other like institutions that can help us move forward.

No matter what direction we decide to go, we will continue to invest in our athletic department to enhance scholarships, facilities, and staffing. The coming years promise to be exciting as we push our athletic department forward in different ways.

• We continue moving closer towards breaking ground on a multi-purpose indoor practice

facility, which will be a gamechanger for many of our programs and the success of our current capital campaign.

- Last summer, we started to enhance the inside of the W.E. Osmon Fieldhouse with minor renovations, and we're expecting to complete a major paint job this summer that will give a new look and feel inside the Bubble.
- Our golf program has expanded and improved its indoor training facility, and earlier this month opened it up to the public for a virtual golf scramble on their simulator.
- We are in the process of building a new press box at the football & track stadium, which will be in place for fall of 2024.
- Replacement of our current football turf, which is 12 years old, and new visitor bleachers are also on the horizon with initial money committed from campus and fundraising efforts ongoing.
- Softball has renovated its outdoor batting cage, which was out of commission for a few years, and we've added a press box and new signage to the field.
- The Valley City Baseball Association (VCBA) completed a new clubhouse at Charlie Brown Baseball Field last year, which our college team has access to. The VCBA also built a new larger batting cage at the field in 2022.

I trust as we move forward you will continue to see our progress and stay involved with our programs. Go Vikings!

2023-2024 SEASON RECAP BASKETBALL

Women's Basketball

The Valley City State women's basketball team finished the season with a 13-14 overall record and a 7-5 mark in conference play. The Vikings earned a No. 3 seed for the NSAA Postseason and fell to No. 6 Dickinson State in the conference tournament quarterfinals.

Ashlyn Diemert was named 1st Team All-Conference while

JayCee Richter and Hailey Roberts each earned an Honorable Mention All-Conference nod. Elyse Hebrink was named VCSU's Champion of Character.

Diemert was named 1st Team All-Conference after leading the Viking squad with 15.8 points per game on the season and 20.3 points per game in conference play. Diemert poured in a career-best 37 points – just one point off the VCSU single-game scoring record – in a home win over Viterbo University on Feb. 9.



Richter was named Honorable Mention All-Conference and averaged 10.6 points and 6.7 rebounds per game on the season. Richter scored a career-best 31 points while going 13for-14 from the field on Jan. 17 against Mayville State. Roberts earned Honorable Mention All-Conference.



averaging 11 points per game overall and 12.7 points per game in conference action. She averaged nearly 2 steals per game as well. Roberts scored a career-high 34 points in a home victory over Waldorf University on Feb. 10.

The Vikings graduate just one senior in Adriana Torres, who scored her 1,000 career point during the season and finished her Viking career with 1,197 points (14th in VCSU history) and 641 rebounds (6th).



Men's Basketball

The Valley City State men's basketball team finished the 2023-24 season with an 11-16 overall record this season and a 3-9 mark in conference play. The Vikings placed 7th in the North Star standings and ended its season at Mayville State in the NSAA Tournament

quarterfinal round. VCSU's Cleveland Bedgood was named 2nd Team All-Conference after leading the conference in scoring this season. The senior averaged 19.3 points per game overall and 21 points per game in conference play. He scored a career-high 46 points against Viterbo University on Jan. 26. That was the third highest singlegame total in VCSU history and the most by a Viking in the last 50 years.

Lamar Grayson added 12.5 points per game while shooting 51 percent

from the field, and Odier Olange averaged 9.7 points per game while shooting 54 percent overall. VCSU junior Hunter Lyman was named VCSU's Champion of Character which recognizes players who represent the NAIA's five core values.

Erin Maitland '03

Lenore, Manitoba Softball/Volleyball, 1999-02

Erin Maitland was a 4-time All-

Conference selection as a Viking softball player. She was named All-Conference after a strong freshman season in 1999 and continued to earn that honor for each of the next three seasons. She primarily played infield, but also pitched for the Vikings. During her senior season in 2002, Maitland batted .346 with 23 runs scored, 12 extra-base hits and 21 RBI. She struck out just six times in her 127 at bats. As a junior she batted .348 with 15 extra-base hits and 25 RBIs. She was also a twotime NAIA Scholar-Athlete.



Cara Miller '02

Brandon, Manitoba Softball, 2000-02 Cara Miller earned three straight All-Conference

selections on the softball diamond from 2000 to 2002. She excelled as both a hitter and pitcher for the Vikings. During her senior season, she set a school record with a dominating 1.06 ERA in 131 innings. She pitched 17 complete games that season, had three shutouts and struck out 199 batters. As a hitter, she batted .375 in her senior season and scored 31 runs. She was nearly as dominant as a junior, batting .385 at the plate while also picking up 15 pitching wins and posting a 1.66 ERA and 205 strikeouts in 140 innings.



Brent Miller '02

Fargo, N.D. Football, 1998-2001 Miller excelled as a defensive

lineman for the

VCSU football team, earning three straight All-Conference selections from 1999 to 2001. He totaled 32 sacks and 54 tackles for loss over those three seasons, including 12 sacks as a senior. Miller was named Honorable Mention All-American as a senior in 2001. His 32 career sacks ranks third in Viking history and his 54 TFL ranks him 2nd. He had at least 30 tackles in all four seasons as a Viking and finished with 194 career stops.

Darin Walters '02

Wahpeton, N.D. Football, 1997-2000 A dominant offense lineman, Darin Walters helped anchor a strong VCSU offensive line during his time as a

Viking. He earned Honorable Mention All-Conference as a sophomore in 1998, and then was selected 1st Team All-Conference as both a junior and senior. Walters achieved nationwide respect and was named Honorable Mention All-American after his senior season, during which VCSU averaged 32 points per game, posted a 9-2 overall record and advanced to the NAIA national playoffs.



Amanda Brown '11

Limon, Colo. Women's Basketball, 2007-11 Amanda Brown was a solid all-around

player from day one on campus and blossomed into an Honorable Mention

All-American as a senior, helping to lead the VCSU women's basketball team to its first ever national tournament appearance. Brown averaged double-digit scoring in each of her last three seasons and finished her Viking career with 1,297 points, ranking 9th in school history. She also ranks 11th in rebounds (571), 9th in assists (233) and 6th all-time in steals (156). She earned two All-Conference selections, including 1st Team All-Conference and Honorable Mention All-American in 2011. Brown was also a two-time NAIA scholar-athlete.

2010-11 VCSU Women's Basketball

Under the guidance of head coach Jill DeVries, the 2010-11 VCSU women's basketball team set a school record with 23 wins, won the Dakota Athletic Conference Postseason Tournament and qualified for the NAIA National Tournament for the first time in program history. The Vikings finished the season with a 23-9 overall record and a 10-4 mark in conference play, earning the No. 2 seed for the postseason. VCSU opened the conference tournament beating Mayville State 67-64 in the



quarterfinals and Minot State 71-66 in the semifinals. The championship was played against rival Jamestown in front of a raucous crowd at VCSU's W.E. Osmon Fieldhouse. Caitlyn Wojahn, Kristin Bearstail, Amanda Brown and Brittany Lehner all scored double figures in the championship game as VCSU won 74-69. The Vikings would lose a close 71-65 game to Sterling College in the first round of nationals. Brown was named 1st Team All-DAC and Honorable Mention All-American. Wojahn earned 3rd Team All-DAC honors. Bearstail (12.5 ppg) and Brown (12.3 ppg) were the team's leading scorers. The Vikings also ranked No. 2 nationally in academics, posting a 3.69 team GPA.



Viking Volleyball enjoys historic season

The Valley City State volleyball team opened the 2023 season with a new coaching staff and finished with a trip to the final site of the NAIA Volleyball Championships in Sioux City, Iowa, for the first time in program history.

First-year head coach Michelle Meiklejohn led the Vikings to a 23-11 overall record this fall, coming off an 11-17 record in 2022. VCSU's 23 wins is its most since the 1998 season when the Vikings won 25 matches.

VCSU took notable wins over four nationally ranked teams, including a home sweep over defending national champion University of Jamestown – its first win over the Jimmies since 2011. The Vikings finished the conference season in second place with an 8-4 NSAA record and were one of three NSAA teams to advance to the NAIA Volleyball Championships.

VCSU's first ever national tournament match came at Central Methodist University in the NAIA Opening Round. The Vikings won that match 3-1 and advanced to NAIA Pool Play as one of the final 24 teams remaining. Valley City State's season ended in pool play as they loss to a pair of Top 12 programs, dropping matches to No. 3 Eastern Oregon and No. 11 Montana Tech.

Viking junior Sadie Hansen earned the North Star Athletic Association Setter of the Year award and was named NAIA 3rd Team All-American. Hansen, along with teammates Bailey Nelson and Danielle Hagler were each named 1st Team All-Conference while Morgan Freije earned 2nd Team All-Conference.

As a team, VCSU held NAIA Top 10 rankings in digs per set (6th), kills per set (6th) and assists per set (9th). The Vikings also made history in the VCSU record books, posting several Top 10 marks as a team and individuals. Nelson hit 1,500 career kills and finishes her career 4th in Viking history. Hansen reached 3,000 career assists during the season and is currently 2nd in school history.

VCSU graduates senior hitters Bailey Nelson and Mardi Scutchings but returns a core of its starters for next season.



Peraza places 4th at nationals

Viking sophomore Jaiden Peraza earned All-American honors in high jump to highlight the 2024 indoor track and field season at VCSU.

Peraza cleared 2.05 meters (6 feet, 8.75 inches) at the NAIA National Championships on March 1 as he took home fourth place out of 30 competitors from around the nation. It was Peraza's first career All-American honor. He also qualified for nationals in the long jump competition, during which he placed 18th out of 25 competitors with his top mark of 6.84 meters (22 feet, 5.25 inches).

Peraza's performances at the national meet highlighted the indoor track season, which also included three individual conference titles and 11 All-Conference performances by the Vikings.

Peraza won conference titles in the high jump and long jump, and Viking sophomore Cameron Champagnie took home the title in the men's triple jump during the conference meet in Brookings, S.D.

"The team came together and had an outstanding time at the conference meet," said VCSU head coach Laquone Robinson. "The outcomes demonstrated that, and many athletes stepped up. I'm eager to find out what lies ahead for them." As a team, the Viking men scored 80 total points and finished third out of six teams. The Viking women scored 78 team points and placed fourth out of six teams. Peraza was named the men's Field MVP of the Meet after racking up 28 points in the jumping events. Along with his two titles, he also placed second in the triple jump for a trio of All-Conference honors.

The Viking men had six All-Conference finishes (Top 3), all of which came in the jumping events.

Valley City State's men swept the Top 3 spots in the long jump. Peraza picked up the individual title and was followed by Champagnie in second place and Aaron Cutshall in third. In triple jump, Champagnie won the title and Peraza placed second. In the high jump, Peraza won the individual title.

VCSU's women tallied five All-Conference finishes. Jasmine Barnes placed second in the 5,000 meters and third in the 3,000 meters. Karly Just took home a third-place finish in the 5,000 meters. Freshman Emma Muggli had a pair of All-Conference finishes, taking third in both the pentathlon and triple jump.
